Watering in A Drought Year

Emery County is in a moderate to severe water shortage for our cities and town this year. We are being asked to be conservative in our watering usage. We can do things to use less water by:

- Fix Leaks: dripping taps, toilets running constantly, faulty valves, broken pipes, damaged or malfunctioning sprinklers, etc.
- Install water saving devices
- Improve management; where can you cut back in your water usage in the house and outside.
- Watering Lawns; we water lawns to often, we can cut back on how much are lawns receive and they will survive. If we are limited further, making sure vegetable gardens, scrubs and trees are watered is the smarter choice.

Don't Let Your Sprinkler Controller **CONTROL YOU!**

Residents with automatic sprinklers systems typically water 44% more than the lawn needs. Make sure you use your controller wisely by trying the following:

- Your landscape needs less water during the spring and fall than it does in the summer. Water the same amount of time, but make the periods between watering longer.
- Let mother nature help. We get 20%-40% of the moisture our lawns need to remain healthy during the season—take advantage of this gift and help conserve our water
- Cycling. Clay type soils and steep slopes usually cannot absorb water fast enough to prevent it from running off. If such conditions exist in your landscape, program your controller to water for several shorter periods, with about an hour in-between, to let the water soak into the soil.
- Give it a Break. Turning your sprinkler controller to fully “Manual” mode can be an extremely efficient way to water your lawn. Keep an eye on your landscape, and water only when you think it needs it.
- Have a Backup. Check your battery replace if needed. Check your settings. Have a copy of your schedule that works best for your landscape nearby so you can easily reprogram the controller if needed.

Removal of Personal Property Off City Streets

A reminder to our citizens, the parking of trailers, cars, boats, ATV, etc. on city streets longer than 24 hours is illegal.
